The history of Halloween, like many traditions has been inspired through generation to generation. As this festival was passed down many things about what it was truly about became distorted, and what we know today is very different to why and how it was in the past. Didn't you ever wonder? Why October 31^{st?}. Who decided to go from door to door collecting candy? Halloween had its beginnings in an ancient, Celtic festival of the dead. The Celtic people were once found all over Europe. According to their calendar, the year began on a day corresponding to November 1st on our present calendar (October 31st). The date marked the beginning of winter. This meant a lot of people, animals and plants usually died due to the cold temperatures of that year. The date marked both an ending and a beginning in an eternal cycle.

The Celtic festival was called Samhain. It was the biggest and most significant holiday of the Celtic year. The Celts believed that at the time of Samhain, more so than any other time of the year, the ghosts of the dead were able to mingle with the living, because at Samhain the souls of those who had died during the year traveled into the otherworld. People gathered to sacrifice animals, fruits, and vegetables. They also lit bonfires in honor of the dead, to aid them on their journey, and to keep them away from the living. On that day all manner of beings were abroad: ghosts, fairies, and demons.

Basically, all-present Halloween traditions can be traced to the ancient Celtic day of the dead. Halloween is a holiday of many mysterious customs, but each one has a history, or at least a story behind it. The wearing of costumes, for instance, and roaming from door to door demanding treats can be traced to the Celtic period and the first few centuries of the Christian era, when it was thought that the souls of the dead were out. Offerings of food and drink were left out to calm and bring peace upon them. Soon enough, people began dressing like these dreadful creatures, performing tricks in exchange for food and drink. (Trick or Treat?) As time went by, people began to think Halloween was something evil not knowing the true history of the Celtic people. Q: How many videos do you have on youtube?


A: I think I have more than 30 songs uploaded.
